Although it is not doubted that most of the gentlemen in this island, who ship sugar for Europe, are fully acquainted with the precautions necessary to give timely advice to their correspondent of their shipping, and to effect insurance on the same; a Gentleman Merchant in Copenhagen has, on observing some irregularities in this point last year, desired the following memorandum to be inserted in this island's gazette:

THE Gentlemen Shippers should recommend to the captain, by whom they send letters for insurance, that if he on his voyage to Copenhagen should go in to any other port in Europe, then immediately to forward such letters per post to Copenhagen, and he be reimbursed the postage by the shippers correspondent in Copenhagen at his arrival there.

All letters concerning insurance should be marked LETTERS OF ADVICE, by which means the captain, to whose care they were recommended, might the more easily know which to send per post.

And whereas some gross mistakes have happened at the delivery of sugars from this island, hog-heads, tierces and barrels, being delivered in one consignment, and the correspondent not acquainted with either size or weight from hence; so it would be necessary that the gentlemen shippers in the invoices should mention, what sort of casks they send, and the particular weight of each.

GENOA, December 29.

Letters from Toulon advise, that on the 19th instant the workmen in the Dock-yard were augmented, in order to finish with the utmost dispatch 15 men of war of the line, and eight frigates; and that at Port l'Orient they were fitting out 40

men of war, which were all to assemble next May at Breit; Mr. Bambevon is to have the command of the latter. The same advices add, that the Grand Master of Malta has refused the Russian ships the liberty of wintering at Malta; and that in order to guard that port against any surprize, he has ordered guns to be mounted upon the batteries and forts, and obliged all persons above fifteen years of age to bear arms.

Hamburgh, Jan. 18. Letters from Hanover advise, that the King of Great Britain has given orders to remount the artillery, not only at Hanover, but also at Stade, Hamelen, Hardeburgh, Nienburgh, and other strong places in the Electorate; to make new baggage wagons, carts, and copper pontoons, to replace those that are worn out; and moreover, to take throughout the whole Electorate, an exact list of all the young men able to bear arms.

Extract of a letter from the Hague, Jan. 25.

"The last letters from Hamburgh say, that a report prevailed there that a large detachment of the King of Prussia's troops had seized upon the City of Dantzick by surprize, and had placed a strong garrison in it; but this news doth not meet with great credit. These letters likewise say, that the Count de Bernstoff heretofore in the service of Denmark, is going to be employed by the King, of Great-Britain in his Electorate of Hanover."

Hamburgh, Jan. 3. Letters from Berlin advise, that the King has sent to Prince Henry of Prussia at Petersburg three ribbons, with the ensigns of the order of the Black Eagle; one of which is designed for the Grand Duke, set with diamonds, another for Count Orlov, and the third for Count de Panin.

Venice, Dec. 29. Advices from the Levant inform us, that the Russians have retaken the island and castle of Stalimene, from whence Hassan Bey, with the assistance of the Dulcig notes, had obliged them to retire: Admiral Spiritoff hath thought proper to make reprisals, by causing all the Turks found in the island to be put to death without mercy; because the latter, not regarding the law of nations, had cruelly murdered all the Greeks and their bishop.

LONDON, January 25.

About three o'clock on Friday afternoon the Right Hon. Lord North laid before the House of Commons, by his Majesty's Command, the two following papers.

Translation of the Declaration signed and delivered by Prince de Maferano, Ambassador Extraordinary from his Catholic Majesty, dated the 22d Day of January, 1771.

His Britannic Majesty having complained of the Violence which was committed on the 10th of June, 1770, at the island commonly called the Great Malouine, and by the English Falkland's Island, in obliging, by force, the commander and subjects of his Britannic Majesty to evacuate the port by them called Egmont; a Step offensive to the Honour of his Crown;—the Prince de Maferano, Ambassador Extraordinary of his Catholic Majesty, has received orders to declare, and declares, that his Catholic Majesty, considering the desire with which he is animated for peace, and for the maintenance of good Harmony with his Britannic Majesty, and reflecting that this event might interrupt it, has seen with Displeasure this expedition tending to disturb it; and in the persuasion in which he is of the reciprocity of sentiments of his Britannic Majesty, and of its being far from his intention to authorise any thing that might disturb the good understanding between the two Courts; his Catholic Majesty does disavow the said violent enterprize;—and in consequence the Prince de Maferano declares, that his Catholic Majesty engages to give immediate orders, that things shall be restored in the Great Malouine, at the Port called Egmont, precisely to the state in which they were before the 10th of June, 1770; for which purpose his Catholic Majesty will give orders to one of his officers to deliver up to the officer authorized by his Britannic Majesty, the port and fort called Egmont, with all the artillery, stores, and effects of his Britannic Majesty, and his subjects, which were at that place, the day above-named; agreeable to the inventory which has been made of them.

The Prince de Maferano declares, at the same time, in the name of the King his Master, that the engagement of his said Catholic Majesty, to restore to his Britannic Majesty the possession of the fort and port called Egmont, cannot, nor ought, any wise to affect the Quef-

tion of the prior right of sovereignty of the Malouine islands, otherwise called Falkland's Islands. In witness whereof, I the underwritten Ambassador extraordinary, have signed the present declaration with my usual signature, and caused it to be sealed with our arms. London, the twenty-second day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy one.

Translation of the Earl of Rochford's Acceptance, dated the 22d day of January, 1771, of the Prince de Maferano's declaration of the same date.

His Catholic Majesty having authorized the Prince de Maferano, his Ambassador Extraordinary, to offer in his Majesty's name, to the King of Great Britain, a Satisfaction for the injury done to his Britannic Majesty by dispossessing him of the port and fort of port Egmont; and the said Ambassador having this day signed a declaration, which he has just delivered to me, expressing therein, that his Catholic Majesty being desirous to restore the good harmony and friendship which before subsisted between the two crowns, does disavow the expedition against port Egmont, in which force has been used against his Britannic Majesty's possessions, commander and subjects; and does also engage that all things shall be immediately restored to the precise situation in which they stood before the 10th of June, 1770. And that his Catholic Majesty shall give orders, in consequence, to one of his Officers, to deliver up to the officer authorized by his Britannic Majesty, the port and fort of port Egmont, as also all his Britannic Majesty's Artillery, stores and effects, as well as those of his subjects, according to the inventory which has been made of them.—And the said Ambassador having moreover engaged, in his Catholic Majesty's name, that what is contained in the said declaration, shall be carried into effect, by his said Catholic Majesty; and that duplicates of his Catholic Majesty's orders to his officers, shall be delivered into the hands of one of his Britannic Majesty's Principal Secretaries of state, within six weeks. His said Britannic Majesty, in order to shew the same friendly dispositions on his part, has authorized me to declare, that he will look upon the said declaration of Prince de Maferano, together with the full performance of the said engagement, on the part of his Catholic Majesty, as a satisfaction for the injury done to the crown of Great-Britain. In witness whereof, I, underwritten, one of his Britannic Majesty's principal Secretaries of state, have signed these presents with my usual signature, and caused them to be sealed with our arms. A sailor hearing of the accommodation with Spain, said all the Lions at our ships heads should be taken down, and Hares put up in their room.

A letter from Paris, dated Jan. 23, says, "The dispute between the King, and the Parliament of Paris, is at length terminated in the punishment of every one of them; and the King has not only exiled them to different places, but sent the major part of them to little villages scarcely inhabited.

A letter from Dublin mentions, that upwards of four thousand tons of Irish provisions are now buying up in the principal ports of Ireland by Dutch Agents, said to be intended for exportation to the Spanish West-Indies.

Some days ago died his Grace John Duke of Bedford, Marquis of Tavistock, a Privy Counsellor, Lord Lieutenant of the counties of Bedford and Devonshire, Chancellor of the university of Dublin, &c. He is succeeded in his titles and estate by his eldest son the Marquis of Tavistock. His Grace was one of the principal persons concerned in making the late inglorious peace with France.

The artificers in the dock-yard at Portsmouth are greatly hurried, most of which work until three quarters after 11 at night.

CHRISTIANSTÆD.

Letters from Copenhagen via Bergen advise, that S. T. General Governor CLAUSEN has gained in the several actions of appeal to supreme court against him from these islands; it is further said his Majesty has been pleased to confer on him the white ribbon, or ensign of the ancient order of Dannebrog.
